Individual liberty- Students will understand the rights and freedoms that citizens in a democracy should have and question the legitimacy of political systems when these rights and freedoms are challenged or removed.	Moral- Recognising right and wrong within the actions of individuals and institutions in Weimar and Nazi Germany.	Students demonstrating how German citizens showed courage and resilience through considering the challenges they face and the actions they took.
