Prayers/Hymns	Passages from the Bible are read to comfort mourners
Light Candles	To represent Jesus as the light of the world as he represents a path to heaven
Church	Funeral held in a Church and led by a Priest, in the presence of God
Islam	
White shroud	The deceased are all wrapped in a white shroud, to show they are equal in death
Burial	All Muslims are buried facing Mecca, to increase their chances of reaching Jannah
Shahadah	“There is no God but Allah and Muhammed is his messenger” is whispered into the deceased’s ear as they are returning to Allah

Celebrant	A Humanist Celebrant conducts the service
Music/eulogy	Music with meaning and messages from relatives may be shared but with no reference to God or faith

Theodicy of Job	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• God permitted Satan to test Job's faith.• His wife tells him to "Curse God and die."• God asks Job impossible questions about universe- God's wisdom is beyond us.• Job never discovers why he suffered but wealth is restored, 10 children, 140 years.	
Adam & Eve	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Moral evil caused by humans (free will).• Adam and Eve ate from the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil. Caused sin	
Soul-making Argument	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Evil helps to develop our souls to become worthy of heaven (Irenaeus)• We are made Imago Dei but not perfect

3. CRIME AND PUNISHMENT

Causes of crime	Difficult finances, upbringing, addiction, mental health.
Aims of punishment	
Reform	To improve a criminal's moral character e.g.. education, counselling (Norway 20%)
Retribution	Revenge on behalf of victim e.g. fine for stealing
Deterrent	Prevention - To discourage people from committing crimes e.g. death penalty
Protection	To protect society from the criminal e.g. 'Whole life order'- Wayne Couzens (police officer who murdered Sarah Everard)

Forgiveness	Jesus forgave us <i>"Forgive them Father"</i> - inspired Gee Walker.

Prophet Muhammad	Prophet Muhammad forgave the man who murdered his uncle in Battle of Uhud.

Evolution	God started evolution 4.5 billion years ago and guides it through Theistic-Guided Evolution
The Big Bang	God caused the Big Bang Ex nihilo (God made the world from nothing)
FUNDAMENTALIST	
Creationism	The Genesis story is 100% accurate. ‘Scripture is God-breathed’
Young Earth	Earth= 10,000 years old- Biblical family tree traced to Adam
Evolution	Evolution is a myth/lie- 6 days.

Isaiah	Old Testament prophet who made predictions about a ‘messiah’
“born of a virgin”	Jesus born to Mary who was a virgin

MEMORIALISM (Church of England)	The bread and wine symbolise Jesus' sacrifice on the cross. <i>"Do this in memory of me."- Last Supper</i>
